


**VILLAGE OF RED HOOK
PUBLIC HEARING
ZONING MAP REVISIONS
OCTOBER 1, 2012
7:00 PM**

Present: Mayor Blundell, DM Kovalchik, Trustee Trapp, Trustee Norris, Trustee Zacharzuk

Trustee Trapp opened the public hearing to discuss zoning map lot line changes. There are different types of zoning within Village limits. Lines were changed to match property boundaries. Residents were informed by letter. The public hearing was closed on 10-2010 and the Village was declared lead agency. SEQRA was reaffirmed and a second public hearing was held. Lolly Humphrey from St Paul's Church stated that zoning changes should not affect the church. They church would prefer to be in NMU and has recently lost two buyers due to the zoning changes on Firehouse Lane. Marie Welsh submitted a zoning map with the county on 1-2010. DM Kovalchik stated that there are DEC wetlands on Smith St. and the current zoning map dates back to 1970. Trustee Trapp stated that he was not in favor of drastic line changes.

Mayor Blundell made a motion to close the public hearing at 7:15. Trustee Trapp seconded. All were in favor.

PUBLIC HEARING
2013 DUTCHESS COUNTY COMMUNITY BLOCK GRANT

Present: Mayor Blundell, Deputy Mayor Kovalchik, Trustee Trapp, Trustee Norris, Trustee Zarharzuk

Mayor Blundell opened the meeting at 7:15 PM for the 2013 CDBG – He gave an overview of project and earlier board discussions. The Village has to define and improve its well water source/supply capacity and is under pressure from Dutchess County Department of Health(DCDOH) to do so as well. Abandoned wells at the village owned property on Rt 199 have proven capacity but when in use had excessive manganese and iron present so they were disconnected years ago. These wells can be used again if we purchase and install a modern package treatment platform that will filter out the naturally present excess minerals. This is a modular product that treats water right on site and is a new development since the wells were abandoned. Our engineers have recommended this approach. Mayor Blundell stated that that revitalizing these well would add 70,000 gallons a day to the Village's water supply which would help with DCDOH. The cost is not in any current budget line and applying for a grant is an option to get the funding.


The board has considered other uses for this year's grant application but has concluded the well project is the most needed task.

Kim Keil questioned the board if the grant will pay for the entire cost of the grant. Deputy Mayor Kovalchik replied yes.

VILLAGE BOARD MEETING
OCTOBER 1, 2012
7:30 PM**

Present: Mayor Blundell, Deputy Mayor Kovalchik, Trustee Trapp, Trustee Norris, Trustee Zacharzuk

Mayor Blundell opened the meeting at 7:30 pm with the Pledge of Allegiance.

DM Kovalchik made a motion to accept minutes from September 10th Village Board meeting and September 20th workshop. Trustee Trapp seconded. All were in favor.

Mayor Blundell welcomed new trustee Steve Zacharzuk to the Board. Steve has been attending Village Board meetings for 7 years and was a member of the Village Planning Board. Trustee Zacharzuk will be working with water on day to day level and reports, handling the Village's wireless, cell tower and facilities demands.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Clerk Cole read the Treasurer's report for the month of September: Balances as of Oct. 1st: General \$ 531,100.08, Water \$ 11,648.99, Trust & Agency \$ 13,371.17, Resource Recovery \$ 557.11, Petty Cash \$ 47.88, Village Green, \$ 2,533.16, Hardscrabble \$ 6,263.38, Health Ins. \$ 8,060.48. Monthly expenses: \$ 69,441.82, Water \$ 6,275.68, T & A \$ 13,371.17, Resource Recovery \$ 2,718.11. DM Kovalchik made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report. Trustee Trapp seconded. All were in favor.

Clerk Cole reported unpaid taxes of \$ 44,194.39.

POLICE

Sergeant Hildenbrand read the police report for September: 109 incidents; 107 UTT's, 10 arrests. A grant from DCJS for \$ 9,500.00 was signed and approved. These funds will be used to purchase police equipment, a new server and body armor.

WATER

Trustee Zacharzuk read the water report: 2 bacteria samples were taken and sent to lab, POC samples retaken and sent to lab as requested by DCHD as a result of spill at Town Highway Garage – results not received yet, SOC sample was taken and sent to lab – results not received yet, located water lines at: Town Highway Garage (old) & Sunoco for sign installation, turned off water at 16 Tower Street as requested (Rogers). Average daily usage for the month: 252,733.

PLANNING AND ZONING

Trustee Trapp read the planning and zoning report for the month of September: 15 building permits, 6 certificates of occupancy, 40 certificates of compliance, 1 municipal search, 1 order to remedy, 2 fire inspections, 2 complaints. \$ 975.00 was collected in fees. Trustee Trapp thanked all of those who donated to the HUGS from Home. Also, Hardscrabble Day was a great success with the Tubes, great concert, good food, great day. Trustee Trapp met with Planning Chair Everett Pearsall to discuss what a great job he and his board members are doing.

The 2013 Block Grant has some funds left over after finishing sidewalk projects. John Wase submitted a proposal to reset pavers that are uneven in the amount of \$ 18,000.00. This would also include some grinding of the sidewalks. A product called polymetic sand will be used to set the pavers, which should keep them stable for the life of the paver.

GARBAGE

Trustee Norris read the garbage report for the month of September:

We do not have the invoice yet to know how many tons of single stream or garbage we generated. We sold \$ 3,510.50 in garbage tags. We are promoting our pay as you throw garbage system: for the next three months, receive a free garbage tag when you purchase ten tags. This offer is only available at the Village Hall, which is open from 9-4 Monday-Friday.

Mayor Blundell stated that from October 1st through December 31st, residents who purchase 10 tags will receive one free.

HIGHWAY

Deputy Mayor Kovalchik read the monthly report as follows:

1. Red Hook Village Sidewalk Project – PIN: 8760.64
 - a. Work is complete on the Sidewalk Project. Approximately 1,100 linear feet of sidewalk on West Market Street (between Phillips Street and Benner Road), two (2) ADA-compliant mid-block crosswalks (Prince Street to Firehouse Plaza and Fraleigh Street to the Red Hook Library), new crosswalk signs, crosswalk striping and a new raised curb with brick pavers (Firehouse Plaza) have been installed.
 - b. The Red Hook Village Sidewalk Project has been funded by grants from the FHWA STP Small Urban Grant Program and the NYSDOT.

2. Catch basins have been installed on Fraleigh Street and Cambridge Drive. The \$6,000.00 Project will be funded in part from a 2008-2009 NYS Assembly Member Item Grant of \$5,000.00 from former Assemblyman Marcus J. Molinaro. The balance of the cost will be deducted from the Maintenance of Streets – Street Maintenance Budget Line (#5110.42).
3. Forty yards of topsoil and grass seed have been purchased and will be used to transition the existing grade to the finish elevation of the new Park Avenue Sidewalk. Costs for this material will be reimbursed from the 2011-2012 CDBG Sidewalk Project. Labor costs for regarding has been provided by the Red Hook Village Highway Department.
4. The first fall brush pick-up has been scheduled from September 26 through October 5, 2012. Additional brush pick-ups will be scheduled after leaf pick-up. Residents are reminded to bring brush to curbside and limit brush pile size to 6' x 6'.
5. The Red Hook Village Landfill, located on Route 199 east of the Village is still open for the season. Village residents, with permits, can deposit yard brush/debris at the Landfill on Saturdays from 9:00am to 2:00pm. Permits are available at the Red Hook Village Building for \$20.00. Announcements for the Landfill closing date are forthcoming.
6. An opening reception for the new Red Hook Village/Town Highway Garage was held on September 21, 2012. Officials and crew members from both the Village and Town attended.
7. An Intermunicipal Agreement between the Village and Town of Red Hook, regarding Municipal Shared Use of the Town Highway Garage was adopted on September 10, 2012 by the Village Board of Trustees and on September 12, 2012 by the Town Council.
8. Scrap metal was sold on September 4, 2012 yielding revenue of \$255.80. The total revenue generated to date for the FY2012-2013 budget year is \$887.94. Since inception of the Scrap Metal Recycling Program in September, 2007, \$12,747.33 has been generated. Proceeds from this program go toward purchasing tools and equipment for the RHV Highway Department. Residents and businesses interested in donating scrap metal can contact Dan Streib at 845-758-8600 or Cindi Cole at 845-758-1081. The Village will assist by picking up scrap metal as requested.

ITF

Deputy Mayor Kovalchik read the monthly report as follows:

1. Red Hook Sewer Project

- a. A surface/subsurface water quality test is being conducted by a Bard College graduate student. Testing procedures and standards are being considered with the NYSEFC, NYSDEC and the NYSDOH. The test results will help determine if existing septic/cesspool systems within parts of the Village are functioning properly.

2. Red Hook Water Project

- a. Phase I/Contract 1G (Well Field Improvement – Prime General Contract), Phase I/Contract 1E (Well Field Improvement – Prime Electrical Contract) and Phase I/Contract 2 (Meter and Meter-Head Replacement Contract) were advertised and available for review from September 10 – 20, 2012.
 - b. Bid proposals were opened on September 20, 2012, 2:00pm, at the Red Hook Village Building. Cindi Cole, Ed Blundell, Brent Kovalchik and Robert Flores (C.T. Male) attended.
 - Two (2) contractors submitted bid proposals for Contract 1G (General).
 - Seven (7) contractors submitted bid proposals for Contract 1E (Electrical).
 - Two (2) contractors submitted bid proposals for Contract 2 (Water Meter Installation).
 - c. Bids are anticipated to be awarded in October, 2012, with an anticipated completion date of January, 2013.
 - d. Short-term financing is in the process of being reviewed and approved by the NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation. A mid-October, 2012 final approval is anticipated.
 - e. Upon closing of short-term financing with the NYSEFC, the \$1.3 million loan application process with USDA-RD will be finalized. Contract Awards will be approved upon final loan application approval by the USDA-RD.
3. Brent Kovalchik attended the “Placemaking in a Changing Climate: The Urban Landscape” symposium at the Norrie Point Environmental Center in Staatsburg, New York on September 10, 2012. Urban placemakers, sustainable site design, urban center resilience/revitalization, green infrastructure in urban land-use strategies, and economic development strategies were presented and discussed. The symposium was sponsored by Sustainable Hudson Valley.

4. Intermunicipal Task Force (ITF)

- a. The Intermunicipal Task Force (ITF) met on September 7, 14, 21 and 28, 2012 at the Red Hook Town Building.

- b. The ITF is currently reviewing and proposing amendments to the existing zones located within the National Historic Landmarks District. Demolition provisions of historic structures and amenities, build-out standards, Historic and Natural Resource Survey/Environmental Overlay Map, scenic viewsheds and bulk regulations of the Town of Red Hook Zoning Law are being reviewed and proposed zoning revisions are being prepared for recommendation and consideration to the Red Hook Town Board.

VILLAGE GREEN

Deputy Mayor Kovalchik read the monthly report as follows:

1. The current balances of the Village Green Committee's related budget accounts as of September 30, 2012 are as follows:

 - Shade Tree – Contractual Expenses (#8560.4)
Balance \$ 5,995.40
 - Village Green Committee Checking Account

2. No Village Green Committee Meetings were held during the month of September, 2012.
3. Tentative dates for the annual Fall Planting are either October 27, 2012 or November 3, 2012. Tree sites in Richard Abraham's Park, Fraleigh Street, North Broadway, Park Avenue, Prince Street, Cambridge Drive and the Red Hook Library are being considered.
4. Integral Tree and Landscape, Inc. pruned trees in the Village General Business District. (4 Locust trees on South Broadway; 1 tree on Bassett Lane). The \$1,740.00 cost for this service will be deducted from the Shade Tree – Contractual Expenses budget line (#8560.4).
5. Sally Dwyer-McNulty and Brent Kovalchik operated the Village Green Committee booth on Hardscrabble Day, September 22, 2012. Tree species posters, tree care manuals, and informational / educational pamphlets were distributed.
6. Six (6) of the twenty-three (23) benches have been installed. The remaining benches will be installed during October, 2012 pending contractors' schedule. Tentative installation dates are between October 9 and October 12, 2012 (weather permitting).

Reimbursements from the 2007-2008 NYSDEC Urban and Community Forestry Grant, a 2004-2005 NYS Assembly Member Item Grant, and donations from the RHACoC, Red Hook Rotary and Kearney Realty Group will be used for the purchase and installation of the benches.

- a. The EDC met on September 13 and 27, 2012 at the RHV Building. The following items were discussed:
 - Investors' status with the Red Hook Promotional Video.
 - Reviewed status and progress of re-development proposals of the former IGA site.
 - Reviewed the EDC's mission "To support and retain existing businesses, foster expansion of commerce and enhance the community," including: alternate retail locations/establishments, needs/challenges of existing businesses, strategies to overcome space limitations in the Village Commercial Center, on-line services, and establishment of connections/relationships with business owners.

- a. There were no Community Preservation Fund/Farmland Protection Advisory Committee Meetings held during the month of September, 2012.

- a. A Red Hook Together Meeting was held at the Red Hook Library. The following items were discussed:
- RH Library
 - i. The Robotics Program, collaboration with the Bard College Computer Club will continue its program at the Library. Primarily geared for High School students, the Program is being considered to be expanded to include adults as well.
 - ii. Mandarin Chinese language courses are once again being offered. Check with the Red Hook Library for more information.
 - iii. Sister Cities/Palestinian Youth Initiative welcomed the Mayor from Mas'ha Palestine at the Hardscrabble Day Parade on September 22, 2012. Bard College is currently developing a relationship with a small village in Israel as a companion Sister City candidate.
 - Bicentennial Committee
 - i. October 9, 2012 – The Red Hook Quilt will be dedicated and permanently located at the Red Hook Town Hall.
 - ii. October 13, 2012 – Closing celebrations will be held at the Elmendorf Inn. A time capsule will be dedicated and placed for future generations.
 - Red Hook Area Chamber of Commerce

- i. Two new businesses have or will soon be opened in the Village of Red Hook. The Village welcomes the Bread and Bottle (formerly Merritt Bookstore) and the Enchanted Café (formerly Red Hook Health Food Store/Tobacco Building).
- PTSA (Parent/Teacher/Student Association)
 - i. October 27, 2012 – “Monster Mash”, a Halloween celebration, will be held at the RH Firehouse between 6:30 pm – 8:00 pm.
 - ii. October 3, 2012 – Village Pizza will be donating 25% of their proceeds taken in on this day to the PTSA.
 - iii. “Super Parents”, a group of parents that will work with other civic groups on community events has been established.
- RHCAN (Red Hook Community Arts Network and Artists’ Collaborative)
 - i. September 26 – October 28, 2012. “Animalis” runs at the RHCAN Gallery on North Broadway. Opening reception is on September 29th from 5:00 pm – 7:00 pm.
 - ii. PANDA will begin filming short informational videos highlighting exhibits and programs of the RHCAN.
 - iii. October 27, 2012 – “Soup CAN”, featuring homemade soups, will be held at the Emporium (South Broadway). The event is to present and re-introduce RHCAN to the community. This event is co-sponsored by the RHACoC.
 - iv. Dutchess County Arts Council is now the fiscal sponsor of RHCAN. Donations can now be considered “charitable” contributions.
- Bard College Center for Civic Engagement
 - i. The Center for Civic Engagement has registered or re-registered over 600 students to vote in the November general election.
 - ii. A candidates “meet and greet” is tentatively scheduled for October 23 or 30, 2012. Meet candidates, or their representatives, running for Federal, State and Local Officers.
 - iii. November 2, 2012 – A “Teach-In” is scheduled to discuss topics centered around the November elections.
 - iv. Citizen Science – Over 500 Bard College Students will participate to assist local public schools with science-oriented programs. Approximately 2,000 students will participate with the Bard College students.

PUBLIC EVENTS

Mayor Blundell announced the annual Panda meeting on October 24th at 6:30 pm.

Also, Mayor Blundell would like to mention in the next newsletter about the private company that will be installing the new water meters throughout the Village. Another

option is to send letters separately to all residents. Trustee Zacharzuk asked if the new company will wear IDs. Mayor Blundell stated yes.

Trustee Zarchzuk stated that his goal is to maintain contracts for vendors on the building. To review the sidewalks on the north side of the Village Hall, the Village parking lot and the green area to be kept clean.

ZONING MAP REVISIONS

Trustee Trapp stated that the Village is in possession of a digital copy of the zoning revisions. Lot lines were cleaned up to be consistent with zoning lines so properties are not split... The Village has lead agency. SEQRA and Negative Declaration were reaffirmed per the October 2010 original work... The original public hearing was held in the summer of 2010. Mayor Blundell made a motion to reaffirm these prior steps of the zoning map. Trustee Trapp seconded. All were in favor.

Mayor Blundell created lot labels for a method to identify newly subdivided land on Firehouse Lane, by St. Paul Lutheran Church. Initial label included a lot "A" and Lot "C" in NMU motion approve lot line maps. Existing maps were modified with letters hand drawn on the document.

DM Kovalchik stated the Land Conservation Dist. already exists, idea is to have a wet land map as a tool for planning and zoning – to use 1 or 2 maps is the question. Line revision also occurs here on existing property borders at the LC zone. Trustee Trapp wants a map to show wetland overlay. Trapp wants future planning board members to have wetland maps, ok to footnote to another map.

DM Kovalchik stated option B in NMU is for small commercial use to supplement a planner's idea for a commerce area near Chocolate Factory.. Mayor Blundell stated B borders existing residents and does not want businesses in someone back yard. DM Kovalchik is in favor of business in NMU.

Motion - Mayor Blundell moved to combine lot A & C into NMU, B will stay in R 10,000. Trustee Trapp seconded. DM Kovalchik stated LC flat wetland over lap map at later date and reference current map.

A new motion was crafted to include lots labeled A, B and C into the NMU and keep the same line revisions at LC. Motion made and seconded.

Trustee Trapp stated opposition to moving ABC into NMU, but is OK on LC, put LC in wetland overlay map at a later time, but that it is a bad move putting B into NMU – must have a variance to get something. Mayor Blundell was still opposed to adding third lot to NMU.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Dutchess County Community Development Consortium Fiscal Year 2013 application for the Village of Red Hook including the certification including therein by and hereby is approved

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the submission of said application to the Dutchess County Department of Planning and Development is and hereby is authorized

A Motion was made by Mayor Blundell to approve resolution 12-2012

RESOLUTION 12-2012. Trustee Trapp seconded. All were in favor.

2012 Energize NY – Mayor Blundell submitted to the Board a resolution from Energize NY – this is a lending participation energy audit for home owners and at no cost to the community. There is no income limits. Clerk Cole read the resolution:

Whereas,, the Village Board o red Hook wishes to participate in the Energize New York Program currently being piloted in the northern Westchester County, in order to extend the benefits of this residential energy efficiency program to the residents throughout the Town/Village/City

Whereas, the Energize Program requires local community participation in order to maximize the outreach in driving demand for energy upgrades of homes; and

Whereas, the Energize Program makes a robust toolkit of esources, including technical assistance, print and online materials, available to municipalities that agree to undertake the Energize Program

Whereas, eligibility for participation is predicated upon the municipality's adoption of the Energize Partnership Pact;

Now, therefore be it resolved: that the Village Board of Red Hook hereby adopts the Energize Partnership Pact, which states as follows Energize New York and the Village of Red Hook will work together to identify the key community resources, to wit, a Municipal Energize Liaison, Energize Champions, and Sponsors, to support the short and long term success of the Energize Program in Red Hook

Be It Further Resolved the Village of Red Hook authorizes the Village Mayor to appoint a Municipal Energize Liaison or Liaisons fr4om among municipal staff or civic volunteers, with affirmation by the Board and the understanding that the Liaisons will service as the chief points of contact between the Energize staff and the Village of Red Hook and its resident and civic associations and groups interesting in promoting residential energy efficiency; and

Be It Further Resolved: The Liaison will work with the Energize staff to identify Energize Champions who typically will be homeowners in the community who have already undergone a Home Performance energy assessment and implemented energy upgrade to achieve savings and whose role will be assist the Liaison in indentifying local civic groups, both formal and informal, also known as Sponsors (a.k.a. Local Trusted Sources), whose members may be interested in learning about residential energy efficiency; and

Be It Further Resolved The Liaison and local Energize Champions will collaborate in the opening doors with civic groups for presentations about the Energize Programs information, and any other outreach methods that the Municipal Liaisons Champions, and Sponsors may find effective in tailoring the Energize Program to this municipality.

Mayor Blundell made a motion to approve resolutions 13-2012. Trustee Norris seconded. All were in favor.

PUBLIC COMMENT


